

Williamston Will Meet Columbia High Here Thursday Afternoon

Lindsay Warren Day Causes A Change In Schedule Of Game

Coach Sam Edwards Expects His Team To Be At Top Strength For Battle

Williamston High School's Green Wave will play host to the Columbia High eleven here Thursday afternoon at 3:30. This game was originally scheduled for Friday afternoon but has been changed to Thursday to afford students of both high schools the opportunity of attending Lindsay Warren Day in Washington on Friday. Columbia High is sending their band to the occasion and since several of their football boys play in the band, the local high school officials are meeting the request of the visitors to have the game played on Thursday afternoon.

The Green Wave is anxious to get on the long end of their season average with a win this week since they have to the present time won ten and lost two games. The locals will go on the field as the favorites with a heavier team and a little more experience behind each player. Coach Sam Edwards has added more power to his forward line of defense with the switch of Hayward Wynne to tackle. Conrad Getsinger has shown up well enough on the left end to be trusted with that berth, thus allowing the shift of Wynne from end to tackle. Miller and Clifton Ward are expected to be back in the lineup this week after a week's rest following their injuries in the game played here two weeks ago. These two did not see action in the game at Beaufort last week. Tootsie Roberson, who did not make the trip last week, hopes to meet his practice sessions this week to be eligible for the game here on Thursday.

War's Spread Causes Worry Over Rubber

War's spread has greatly deepened concern over our rubber supply problem, with 96 per cent of our natural rubber having to come through Far East trouble zone. The problem may be eased by boosting production of synthetic rubbers here, but that takes precious time. In the most succinct sum-up to date, John L. Collyer told the famed sales executive club in New York that 18 months would be required to build and start operating one 35,000-ton synthetic plant—and that this "time lag" must be weighed before assuming that the synthetic type offers an immediate safeguard against possible shortage of natural rubber. He analyzed the nation's rubber position as "four months' supply here, three months' float, three months' supply of finished goods on hand—grand total of 10 months' supply," which could be stretched a couple months by greater use of reclaimed rubber.

Green Wave Goes Down Before The Beaufort Hi, 13-0

Locals Were Heavily Outweighed by Ocean City Eleven

Beaufort's hard charging outfit broke through the local Green Wave gridlers last Friday afternoon for a 13-0 victory. Beaufort had a heavy team that were down the local boys near the end of the first half by sheer power to crush through for their first count. Williamston made a strong bid to even up the score in the third period, but fell short by 20 yards when they lost the ball on downs. In the closing minutes of the game the locals fumbled a punt in their own territory and the Shoremen again pushed through the line for their fine score. Beaufort's hard charging backfield with plenty of good block, was too much for the Green Wave to break up before they had made long advances.

Beaufort held the upper hand all the way leading at the half 7-0, and also gaining 7 first downs to Williamston's three. Coach Edwards used only five substitutes since he had to keep his biggest boys in the game all the time rather than take a chance on having some of the smaller lads hurt by the Beaufort powerhouse.

State Grid Teams Offer An Unusual Schedule Saturday

Wake Forest-Duke and Carolina-Tulane Play in State Saturday Afternoon; N. C. State and Mississippi State Tangle That Night.

Take your pick this week-end, and you can't get stuck on football games if present reports mean anything. Offering fans one of the most unusual slates Saturday, record crowds are expected to witness all three big games to be played in the vicinity of Raleigh, which include two Saturday afternoon games and one night contest.

North Carolina will play host to Tulane's Green Wave at Chapel Hill, and Wake Forest and Duke's Blue Devils will fight it out over in Wake Forest Saturday afternoon. As a nightcap to this pair, N. C. State will engage Mississippi State at Raleigh Saturday evening.

Tulane, hitting its stride last week with a defeat over the strong Rice Owls, is expected to give quite a show of power against the aerial maneuvers of Lallane and Co. of North Carolina. The Wave, ranked in the nation's Big Ten at the beginning of the season, could not click and lost its first three games, although statistics showed the Coach Dawson's lads had plenty on the ball.

The game at Wake Forest also promises to be a natural, with both Duke and Wake Forest suffering a lone defeat. Wake Forest's victory over North Carolina made them the big opposition to Duke's supremacy in Big Five circles, making this battle a fight to a big end.

Capping the climax N. C. State's Wolves meet Mississippi State's Maroons in Riddick Stadium Saturday night, and with the improved State brand of play, the margin of victory should be close after an exciting affray. Remember, the Wolfpack caused Carolina a lot of trouble last week-end, although the Tar Heels finally came out on the big end, and with such a display of courage and fight Coach Newton is preparing his team for a run in the win column.

Barley Produces Pork Of An Excellent Quality

Pound for pound barley is not as efficient as corn but barley does produce pork of excellent quality. It does not pay to grind corn for hogs but it does pay to grind barley and the grinding increases its feed value by 17 per cent. If barley is substituted for corn as hog feed, extension swine special Ellis Vestal, recommends that 120 pounds of the whole barley replace 100 pounds of shelled corn. Because of the usual droughts in summer, it may be well to plant some barley this fall for hog feed next year.

Spring-Flowering Bulbs Should Be Planted Now

The sooner spring-flowering bulbs can be planted, the better they will bloom, says J. G. Weaver, State College floriculturist. They should be planted in October, at least. Prepare the soil well before planting any bulbs. The soil should be pulverized and worked to a depth of at least 10 inches. Commercial fertilizer at a rate of three pounds per 100 square feet may be used if mixed well with the soil. A complete fertilizer high in potash is recommended. A two-inch layer of well-rotted manure may be used if it is worked thoroughly into the soil. Cover each bulb with twice its own depth of soil.
