#### Spring-Flowering Bulbs Should Be Planted Now

The sooner spring-flowering bulbs can be planted, the better they will bloom, says J. G. Weaver, State College floriculturist. They should be planted in October, at least. Pre-pare the soil well before planting any bulbs. The soil should be pul-verized and worked to a depth of at least 10 inches.
