Wake Forest Frosh Meet Norfolk Naval Base in the Feature Event

Number Of Bands In This Section Will Parade Before Game

Baby Deacons Are Undefeated; Offer Outstanding Stars

Armistice Day, November 11th, will be a day long to be remembered in Edenton, according to present plans for a celebration under the auspices of Ed Bond Post of the American Legion.

The biggest feature of the day will be a football game in the afternoon at 2:30 o'clock between the Wake Forest College freshman team and the Norfolk Naval Base Hospital team.

Preceding this attraction a big parade will be held which will include bands from a number of the adjoining towns under the direction of C. L. McCullers, Edenton band director. The affair, while sponsored by the Legionnaires, has the support of the various Edenton organizations and it is expected a large crowd will attend.

The Wake Forest Baby Deacons, under the tutelage of Athletic Director Jim Weaver, Murray Greason, Art Lea and Phil Utley, have steam-rollered practically all opposition this season and are boasting of a freshman eleven, the strongest since the championship '37 team that went undefeated. This year's team won from the Duke frosh 7-6 and over William and Mary's freshmen 13-7.

Last week over at Chapel Hill, they smashed the Tar Heel Yearlings 19-12. Though held to a one touch-down margin, the Deacons led 13-0

Wake Forest's backfield has been sparked in these three successful tilts by Bob Jordan, triple threat quarterback from Whiteville; Johnny Perry, 175 pound fullback from Raleigh, who does most of the punting; Carl Grad, 180 pound blocking back, and Burnie Martin, 205 pound blocking back from Richmond who shares this assignment with Grad.

State's Wolves And Wake Forest Mix In "Grudge" Battle

Wolfpack Holds Big Edge in Number of Victories Over Deacs

Each year practically every team in the country has one game on the schedule that is probably the most important to win. The opposition may not be the strongest on the card, nor may the game bear great importance on any championship race, but what makes it so important to the two schools is the keen rivalry that dates way back.

Such is probably the case between North Carolina State and Wake Forest, who clash in Raleigh Saturday afternoon. There's a rivalry here that just about evens things in the pre-game ratings regardless of the on-paper potentialities of the two foes. The series started in 1907 and except for 1909, there hasn't been a break in grid relations, and State has won 22, Wake Forest 8, and two ended in 0-0 deadlocks.

Before the current campaign began, fans and writers were bemoaning the weaknesses of Coach Newton's State boys and predicting nothing but reverses for them. But the situation changed. State is the only ball club in the Big Five that has scored in all of its games, soundly whipped Davidson and a highly-favored William and Mary outfit, lost a heartbreaker to North Carolina, and played Clemson and Mississippi State even ball games until the waning moments when desperate attempts to score boomeranged.

Wake Forest, on the other hand, has been more of a spotty outfit, looking as if unbeatable at times and very poor at times, although the worst showings came on very hot days when the lack of reserve strength was a telling factor in the downfalls.

In 1938, the Deacs with their flaming sophs were heavy favorites, but what happened in the battle is another story. With State's line throwing back every Wake thrust except one, the Wolfpack scored three times winning 19-7. Last year the two teams met in what was expected to be an even game, but the Deacs came off the field on the long end of a 32-0 score.
