H. B. Hardy, of the News and Observer, was in town yesterday.

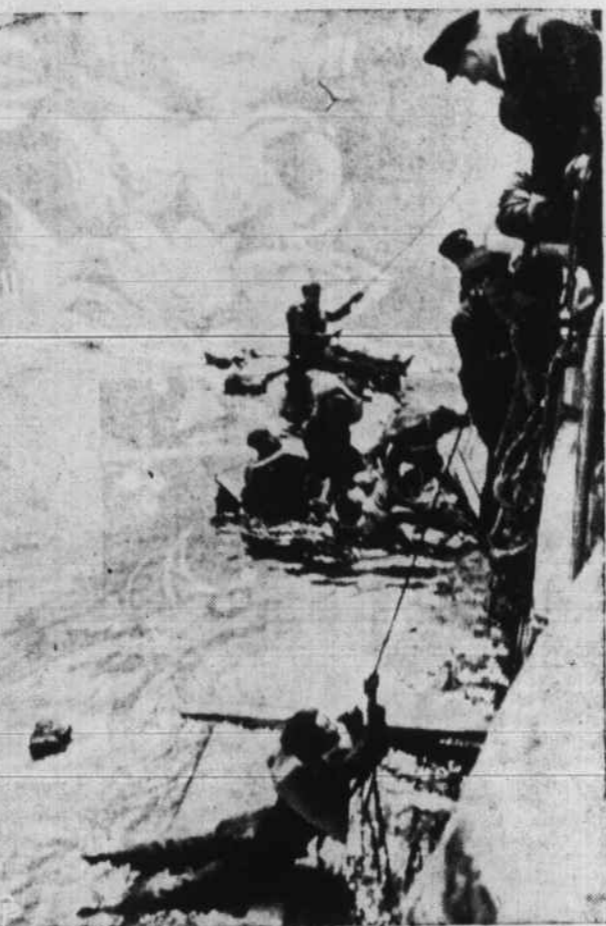

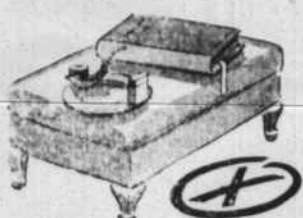
