**War Proves Costly To American Farm**

The war has been costly for American farmers. Wheat shipments, for example, dropped from 61,165,000 bushels in the 10 months ending November 1, 1939, to 13,500,000 bushels in the same period last year. At the same time, however, some farmers specializing in native "old world" crops like limes, figs and demons are enjoying expanded markets. Whereas 176,000 boxes of lemons were imported in 1932, practically none are now purchased abroad and domestic production rose from 7,600,000 boxes in 1931 to more than 12,000,000 boxes last year. Grape growers, who benefitted from a 60 per cent increase in American wine consumption between 1935 and 1939, look for an even more promising future with the entry into the field of firms with nation-wide distribution facilities.
