

Jamesville and Bear Grass Teams Meet In Finals

Girls' Exhibition Will Start Tonight At 7:30

Large Crowd Sees Four Fast Contests In The Semi-Finals

Jamesville Boys and Bear Grass To Play In Boys' Finals At 8:30

And once more the basketball supremacy will be held by Jamesville or Bear Grass, with these teams emerging victorious in the semi-finals of the county high school tournament.

In the semi-finals played Wednesday night, Jamesville's girls defeated Robersonville, 37-21; Bear Grass girls won over Williamston, 20-17; Jamesville boys walloped Williamston 37-19, and the Bear Grass boys edged out a 27-25 overtime victory over Farm Life.

Excitement was plentiful among the large crowd attending the event, with an unusual amount of thrilling moments and well-played basketball.

Robersonville Girls Lose

A fine Robersonville girls team fell by the wayside as M. Martin led her Jamesville chargers to a semifinal victory, 37-21. Robersonville started strong and at the first period was leading 7-5. But something went wrong with the scoring attack and while Jamesville was counting 15 points, Robersonville was unable to score a single point.

M. Martin was the leading scorer for Jamesville with 21 points, while Mizelle was next with 10. Bunting was Robersonville's ace with 12 points. Edmondson played a great defensive game at guard.

Bear Grass Wins Hard Way

In the best contest of the tournament thus far, Bear Grass boys eked out a 27-25 victory over Farm Life in an overtime period. Bear Grass went out in front at the first quarter, leading 8-3, and sported a 12-7 margin at half-time. Both teams went on a scoring rampage in the third period scoring ten points each. Play began fast in the final quarter and Farm Life held Bear Grass to one foul shot while they pulled up to knot the score at 23-23.

In the extra period Bear Grass drew first blood when Albert Harris dropped a two-pointer. But the lead was short as Ben Daniel hit the basket for the tying points. Ben

Taking a quick glance as the leading scorers of the tournament, we find that Bunting, of Robersonville, is leading the girls' division with 26 points in two games. M. Martin, of Jamesville, with 21 points in one game, ranks next, and Hattie Ward, of Bear Grass, with 11 in one game is third. M. Martin leads in high scoring for a single game.

In the boys' division the situation is more difficult. Harris, of Bear Grass, has a total of 30 points for two games, while Roberson, of Bear Grass, and Ange, of Jamesville, each have a total of 23 points for two contests. A. Holliday, of Jamesville, follows close behind with 22 points in a pair of contests. Bennie Daniel, of Farm Life, shot 15 points in a lone affray. The high point scorer in a single game thus far is Harris, of Bear Grass, with 18 points in the opening round.

In losing to Jamesville in the semi-finals, the Robersonville girls evidently took time out for their beauty sleep. Coach Rebecca Webb's protégés not marking up a single point.

Robersonville Girls Conquer Farm Life; Jamesville Boys Win

Bear Grass Boys Score One-Sided Victory Over Oak City

The first round of the County High School Basketball Tournament being held in the Williamston gym was run off last Tuesday evening according to pre-tourney dope, with the Bear Grass boys, Jamesville boys and Robersonville girls gaining positions in the semi-finals Wednesday night. A large crowd was present for the events and had an enjoyable time despite the one-sided decisions.

Bear Grass boys won the first tilt Tuesday evening from Oak City, 50-20, while Robersonville's girls captured a 33-10 win from the Farm Life lasses. In the evening's finale the Robersonville boys fell before the terrific onslaught of Jamesville, 35-8.

Bear Grass Boys Win
Bear Grass and Oak City looked like an even match from the start, with the two teams matching points for points during the first half. At the end of the first period, Bear Grass was ahead by a 11-9 margin, with the end of the half still showing a two-point difference in favor of the Bear Grass lads, 15-13.

But the third quarter came, and Oak City dropped behind fast as Harris and Roberson sank shots from all angles to send Bear Grass ahead, 30-17. The fourth quarter was even worse than the third for the Oak City boys, as Bear Grass bagged 20 points while Oak City counted only three.

Harris, with 18 points, and Roberson, with 16, led the Bear Grass scoring, while Tyson, with 7, was tops for Oak City.
