HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

"WELCOME, SWEET SPRINGTIME"

Why not let a crisp tossed salad bring the first breath of spring to your table?

Tossed Salad

Chop and combine: 10 radishes, 2 cucumbers, 1-3 cup sliced scallions, 1-4 cup chopped celery, and a bunch of washed watercress. Mix in a wooden bowl with Tangey French Dressing, made this way: Blend together 3 tablespoons vinegar, 1-2 cup mayonnaise, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, 2 drops tabasco sauce and 1 tablespoon French dressing. Mix, pour over salad and toss.

Creole Salad

7 can pineapple (drained)
3 pkgs. cream cheese
2 tbsps granulated gelatine
1 cup almonds, blanched and split
1-2 pt cream, whipped
1 green pepper, minced
Soak gelatine in part of pineapple juice. Heat remainder and dissolve gelatine. When cold, add cream cheese, beat smooth, add crushed pineapple and almonds. When beginning to set, add whipped cream, pinch of cayenne and salt to taste. Mold. Serve with mayonnaise or Especial Fruit Salad Dressing.

Special Fruit Salad Dressing

1 cup pineapple juice
Juice 1 lemon
Juice 1 orange
1-2 tsp salt
1-4 cup sugar
1 tbsps corn starch
1 tsp dry mustard
2 eggs
1 cup whipped cream
Mix dry ingredients. Combine fruit juices, add to other mixtures. Cook in top of double boiler until thick. Beat egg yolks well and add to cooked mixture. Cook five minutes more. Beat egg whites well. Combine with cooked mixture. Cool.

Just before serving, cut in whipped cream.

Rhubarb Cheese Pastry Tarts

Cheese Pastry:
1 3-4 cups flour
1 tsp salt
1-2 cup shortening
2-3 cup American cheese, grated
1-4 cup ice water
Cut in shortening and add the cheese. Add water and mix lightly. Chill, then roll out as for pie crust. Fit pastry over inverted tart or muffin tins. Prick well. Bake about 25 minutes at 450°.

Rose Rhubarb:

2 cups rhubarb, cut in 1 inch pieces
3-4 cup sugar
3-4 cup boiling water
3 1-2 tbsps minute tapioca
1-4 cup orange juice
Cook rhubarb, sugar and boiling water for 5 minutes. Reduce heat and cook 5 minutes longer. Add tapioca, stir well; cook 15 minutes longer on a low heat. Remove, add orange juice; cool. Fill baked tart shells, top with whipped cream or meringue.

Pecan Chocolate Mousse

2 squares unsweetened chocolate
1 3-4 cups milk
1-3 cup sugar
4 egg yolks, slightly beaten
1 pkg. strawberry flavored gelatin
1-4 tsp salt
1-2 tsp vanilla
1-2 cup chopped pecan meats
1 cup cream, whipped
Add chocolate to milk and heat in double boiler. When chocolate is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Combine sugar and egg yolks; add small amount of chocolate mixture, stirring vigorously; return to double boiler and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add gelatin and salt and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Chill. When slightly thickened, add vanilla and fold in nuts and cream. Turn into individual molds. Chill until firm. Serves eight.

Sealed bids will be received until 11 o'clock A.M. March 25, 1941, by the undersigned at its office in the city of Raleigh, N. C., for the bonds of the town of Williamston, N. C., hereinafter described. There will be no auction. The bonds are dated March 1, 1941; denomination \$1000; principal and interest (M & S 1) payable in lawful money in New York City; coupon bonds not registerable; general obligations; unlimited tax; no option of payment before maturity; delivery at place of purchaser's choice.

Bidders may submit bids for the bonds described in any of the following paragraphs:

(1) For \$35,000 Public Improvement Bonds maturing annually on March 1, 2000, 1943 to 1955, inclusive, \$4000, 1956 and 1957, and \$1000, 1958.

(2) For \$25,000 Street Paving Bonds maturing annually on March 1, 2000 1942 to 1948, \$1000 1949 to 1954, inclusive, \$2000 1955 and 1956, and \$1000 1957.

(3) For the bonds of both issues aggregating \$60,000 and maturing annually on March 1, 2000 1943 to 1948, inclusive, \$3000 1949 to 1954, inclusive, \$4000 1955, \$8000 1956, \$5000 1957, and \$1000 1958.

Bidders are requested to name the interest rate or rates, not exceeding 6 per cent per annum in multiples of 1-4 of 1 per cent.
