HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

The Lenten Season has been with us for some weeks now and perhaps we need appetite arousers—Piquant as a primrose—Perky as a pansy are the type required.

Try mixing equal parts of grapefruit and tomato juice with a sprinkling of powdered sugar.

Chilled cranberry juice with a thin slice of orange.

Heat sufficient V 8 and serve with slice of lemon and croutons.

Any of these and you will be prepared to do full justice to the main course.

Salmon Souffle
Temperature: 350 deg. Fah. Time: 25 minutes.

2 cups flaked salmon
1-2 cup milk
4 eggs, separated
1-2 tsp salt
Few grains pepper
1-4 tsp paprika
1 cup dry bread crumbs
2 tsp lemon juice
Drain canned salmon, remove skin and bones, and divide into small pieces or flakes. Measure the milk, add beaten egg yolks, salt, pepper and paprika. Then add the salmon, mix well, add bread crumbs and finally the lemon juice, mixing lightly with a fork. Fold in the egg whites, beaten stiff. Put into shallow, greased baking dishes and bake in a fully pre-heated oven until light brown and done in the center. Serve immediately. This souffle contains more than the usual amount of bread, hence it will not fall, but it tastes best when just baked. Provide hot tomato sauce.

Scalloped Corn
Mix together the contents of one No. 2 can of corn, one cup of milk and one egg. Well beaten. Sprinkle a greased baking dish thickly with crumbs and add the corn mixture and cover thickly with more crumbs. Bake until firm and lightly browned. 30 minutes 375°.

Apple Roll
With Hot Cheese Sauce. Temperature: 450 deg. Fah. Time: 30 minutes. Then 350 deg. Fah. about 20 minutes.

Biscuit Dough
3 cups flour
1 tsp salt
3 tbsps shortening
8 tsp baking powder
1 cup milk
Sift flour and salt, cut in shortening, sift in baking powder and mix lightly, add milk, press together into a smooth dough and knead gently one-half a minute.

Apple Mixture
4 cups sliced apples
1-2 cup sugar
1-2 tsp cinnamon
1-4 tsp nutmeg
Mix the raw, sliced apples together with other ingredients. Shaping the roll.
Roll the dough about three-eighths of an inch in thickness, spread lightly with softened butter, then spread with the apple mixture, and roll up carefully, like a jelly roll. Prick with a fork and bake thoroughly.

3-4 cup milk
1 cake compressed yeast
2 1-3 cups flour
1-3 tsp salt
1-4 tsp cardamon
1-2 cup raisins

About 1 1-4 cups additional flour
This cake won first prize at the Mississippi Valley Fair.

Cream the sugar and butter together thoroughly; add well beaten egg. Heat the milk to lukewarm temperature, crumble the yeast into about three tablespoons of it, stir until dissolved, then add remaining milk, and add to the above mixture.

Sift together the flour, salt and powdered cardamon, and add these, stirring to make a stiff dough; add the raisins and turn this mixture out onto the additional flour on the board. Knead lightly and gently to make a soft dough, yet sufficiently stiff that it may be handled without the addition of any flour in subsequent kneading.

Put the dough into an oiled bowl, turn it over to oil the top, let rise until doubled in bulk, knead it thoroughly but quickly and lightly, return to the bowl to rise again until doubled. Then knead into the desired shape. Put in pan and let it rise until doubled in bulk, then bake in a fully preheated oven.
