## Develop Materials For Defense Needs

An interesting sidelight on the re-arming program has been the novel military application of many materials developed for civilian and industrial use. The Army is testing parachutes made from nylon, the stocking material; kerosene shower curtains were found to possess unusual resistance to mustard gas. And now the air-cell sponge latex mattress is to make life easier for tank crews who get tossed about inside the lurching vehicles. More than 100 pounds of a luxurious mattress and upholstery material is to be used in lining the Army's new M-3 tanks. Designed by Capt. Joseph M. Colby, tank veteran of the ordnance department, the M-3 will have its hatches, gun turrets, gun recoil guards and every hazardous interior part covered with a frothy rubber. It also cuts down weight of tanks by doing away with insulating material, as the high air content of rubber cushioning provides protection against extremes of heat and cold which have plagued tank crews.
