Mrs. Bettie Bullock, of Cross Roads Township, died at her home Monday, April 21st, at 2:30 p. m.

Carroll Wilson, Roanoke Rapids, (First Division)

Mr. Wilson was born on September 8, 1900 in Bowling Green, Kentucky, son of John Lawrence and Nellie Carroll Wilson; orphaned at an early age, he was reared by his maternal grandfather, John Charles Carroll, whose people lived in Halifax and Warren Counties, North Carolina. Mr. Wilson attended Yale University, where he graduated as the youngest member of the class of 1919 with an AB degree. In the World War he served as a member of the famous Yale Battery as gun instructor in field artillery. He is a member of the American Legion. Following the World War he served for three years in Maine and Canada in the forestry engineering department of a pulp and lumber company crusing timber, laying out camps and roads. He subsequently served for several years as owner and publisher of the Hazard Herald and as correspondent for the Louisville Courier Journal. In 1928 he became editor of the Edenton N. C. Daily News with affiliated weekly papers in Hertford, Windsor, Aulander, Columbia and Plymouth. In 1929 he bought and now owns and operates the Herald Printing Company, and is the editor and publisher of the Roanoke Rapids Herald, a newspaper, with large circulation in that section of the state. Mr. Wilson has been president of the Halifax County Young Democratic Club for the last six years; was a member of the State Executive Committee of the Young Democratic Club for two terms; president Roanoke Rapids Kiwanis Club two terms; Lt. Governor Northeastern Kiwanis District covering 15 counties in Northeastern North Carolina, chairman of Roads and Public Affairs Committee of the Club for 5 years; director of the Roanoke Rapids Building and Loan Association for past 6 years; director and chairman of Roads Committee of the Roanoke Rapids Merchants Association for past 6 years; during last several years has served as chairman of local committee in connection with building new Armory, new Post Office building, municipal building, and installing water and sewerage system; is chairman of the Roanoke Rapids Committee to Defend America by Aiding the Allies. Mr. Wilson is a member of the Presbyterian Church; married Miss Mary Davenport Ashford, and they have one daughter, aged 10.
