Young Musicians Banded Together By Life In Army

Local Young Man Instrumental in Forming Choir Down In Louisiana

Many new combinations in life have been effected by the Selective Service Act, and Martin County young men have figured in quite a number of those combinations. A recent story coming out of Shreveport, Louisiana, tells how sixteen young musicians, gathered from all parts of the country and banded together by life in the army, organized a choir and are now boosting morale and brightening the life of many service men.

Pooling their talents under the direction of Ben Manning, army son of Mr. and Mrs. John A. Manning, of Williamston, fifteen young musicians recently organized the interdenominational Barksdale chapel choir which presented its first program in Shreveport last Sunday.

Commenting on the choir, the Shreveport Times last Saturday said: "It will take part in various programs of a religious and recreational nature and plans more ambitious concerts when the necessary practice can be gotten in."

"The solo organist, Manning, is a native of Williamston, N. C. and was organist at the Memorial Baptist Church here during his high school days. He was given a bachelor of arts degree at Duke University in 1940.

He has studied organ under Edward Hall Broadhead and was organist at West Durham Methodist Church. He also studied at Union Theological Seminary with Dr. Clarence Dickinson. He was working toward a master's degree in sacred music when he was drafted. At that time he was organist at Trinity Methodist Church in New York City."

Young Manning's picture appeared in the Times along with that of Private Ted Bodenheimer, co-organizer and leader of the choir, of Winston-Salem.
