

Many Packages Are Delivered To Men In German Prisons

Red Cross Gets Receipts for The Delivery of 100,000 Bundles

Washington, D. C. — One of the bright spots in the European war is the way in which the American Red Cross has been able to ship more than 100,000 food boxes to Allied prisoners inside Germany.

Not only has the American Red Cross been able to report safe delivery by the International Red Cross at Geneva but American donors of the food boxes are getting postcard receipts signed by the prisoners.

Within a broader program in which the American Red Cross provides food packages, clothing and comfort articles for general distribution among Allied prisoners, special food packages are sent at \$2.40 each to identified prisoners on behalf of friends and relatives in this country.

Despite disrupted postal communications, more than 2,000 receipts have come back to Washington. They

are passed on to donors through local chapters.

From the cards of gratitude that are beginning to come in, Red Cross food packages are meaning quite a bit to the estimated 3,000,000 Allied prisoners confined behind barbed wire here and there in Germany.

At Geneva, the American Red Cross maintains a reserve of food packages which are shipped from this country via Lisbon. At Lisbon a Red Cross boat, sailing under special agreement between belligerents, carries the packages to Marseilles, where they are routed to Geneva.

The food packages weigh 11 pounds. Their contents have been carefully chosen by nutrition experts familiar with customary deficiencies in prison diets. Here's what they contain:

One 14-ounce can of irradiated evaporated milk, one 8-ounce package of hardtack, an 8-ounce tin of cheese, one 8-ounce tin of instant cocoa, one 15-ounce tin of sardines, a 12-ounce tin of pork, 12-ounce tin of corned beef, two 6-ounce chocolate bars, 4 ounces of granulated sugar, one 7-ounce tin of powdered orange juice, 16 ounces of prunes, four ounces of coffee, 2 packages of cigarettes, and 2 1-2 ounces of smoking tobacco.

While the American Red Cross forwards supplies for prisoners of war in Germany, it also serves as an in-

Plowing Under Of Stalks Is Effective In Fighting Insects

Plowing under cotton and tobacco stalks is a simple, effective means of combatting hordes of insect pests that will attack these two major cash crops next year, says J. O. Rowell, extension entomologist of N. C. State College.

Many tobacco stalks have already been killed but those growers who still have stalks growing in the fields should act immediately in destroying them.

Rowell said tobacco stalks develop suckers, which furnish a food supply for large numbers of flea beetles, horn worms, bud worms, and other destructive pests until frost.

If the development of these suckers is prevented, most of the insects will starve to death or will go into winter hibernation so weak they cannot emerge the following spring and lay eggs for the 1942 crop of pests. A good cover crop should follow the stalk plowing.

Cotton farmers, now sending their lint to market, should take the same precautions, the State College specialist said. Every effort should be made to pick the cotton as soon as possible, and then destroy all stalks with a good stalk cutter. Then the land should be plowed, disced, and sown to a winter cover crop.

This procedure will prevent the late development of boll weevils and will do more than any other one thing to insure fewer weevils in 1942. It is one of the simplest methods of weevil control. Especially is this important this fall, since weevils staged one of their biggest attacks in years on the 1941 cotton crop.

Agriculture Leaders Will Aid In 1942 Farm Plan

G. T. Scott, chairman of the State USDA Defense Board with headquarters at State College, says that beginning this week fieldmen and leaders of every branch of the U. S. Department of Agriculture will cooperate in a farm-to-farm drive and talk personally to every farmer about what foods will be needed in 1942, working out a farm plan under which the grower can work to his own advantage next year.

Bean Crops In New Hanover Are Reduced

Bean crops in the New Hanover County area have been sharply reduced because of continued dry weather, the third period of unfavorable crop weather in North Carolina.
