

Secrecy Surrounds Army Information

Fort Jackson, S. C. — Parents, wives and sweethearts who give out information as to the location and movement of soldiers in the nation's military forces may be endangering the very lives of their loved ones, post officials here have warned.

The urgency for the "folks back home" to keep secret all information regarding United States troops is just as important as for members of the military personnel. Although information as to strength, composition, location and movement of troops may at times seem inconsequential, it may be of great value to enemies of the United States. Any information as to routes, schedule and destination of troop movements may result in sabotage and the loss of lives of the troops concerned at a time when the nation is greatly in need of its fighting manpower.

Information as to location and activities of troops often is contained in letters written to parents, wives and sweethearts by the men of the fighting front and in army camps. In some instances, unthinking parents have even given these letters to newspapers for publication which makes them an open book of very valuable information to the enemy. At this stage of the war, military leaders point out that enemies of our country are seeking to gain knowledge of the location, strength and activities of every military organization in the United States.

The mere statement of a member of the family of an officer or enlisted man that he is at a certain place, or that he is going to such a place, may cost him his life.

Seed Collections Cost Around \$5.50

A garden on every farm has been proclaimed a patriotic and economic "must" in the National war effort. To this end, a "Victory Garden" campaign is being organized throughout North Carolina and the rest of the nation.

As an important part of the "Victory Garden" campaign, the extension horticulturists at N. C. State College, have made up a list of garden-seeds needed to feed a family of five for a full year. Seed dealers in every part of the State have agreed to offer these seed collections in special packages, at a reduced rate when bought all at the same time.

H. R. Niswonger, one of the horticulturists, says the prices of the garden seed collections range from \$5.35 to \$6.50, as quoted by dealers. The packages contain about 26 pounds of garden seed, which, if planted correctly and cultivated properly, will furnish an abundant supply of fresh vegetables for a farm family of five, with a surplus for canning and storage.

"If a farmer buys this special garden seed package, he will save considerable money," Niswonger declared. "A comparison of prices quoted by dealers for the 26-pound collection, with seed catalogues listing the various seeds in separate packages, shows that the seed would cost from \$2.65 to \$12 more when bought at intervals during the garden planting season."

The State College leaders said that county farm and home agents have information on the source of these special garden seed collections.

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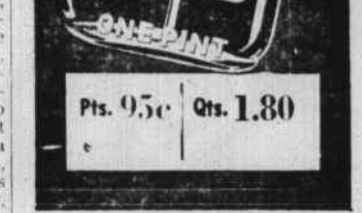

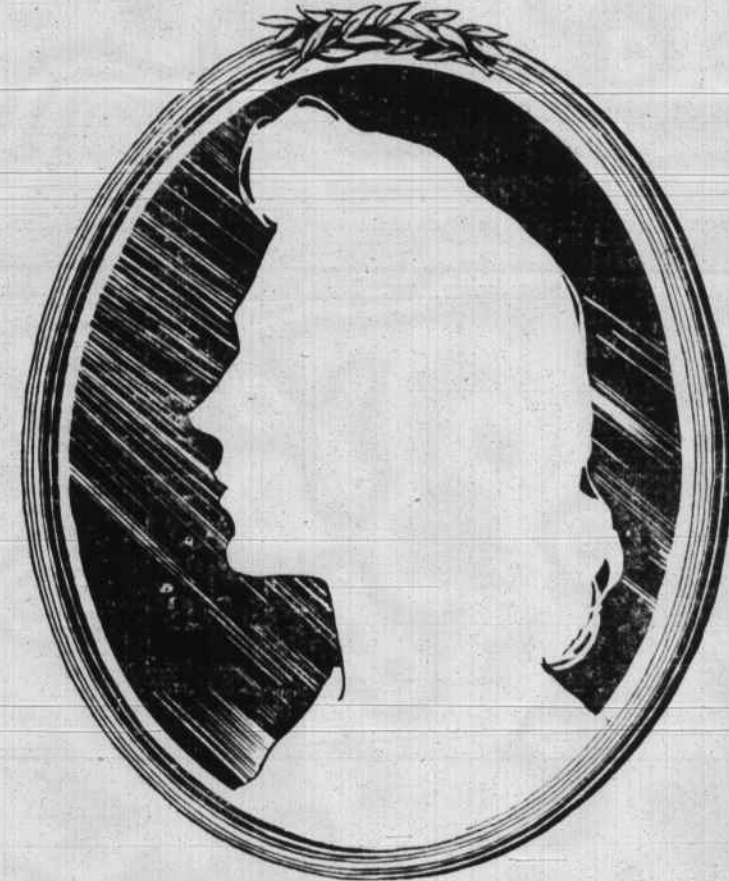

Because the brackets embracing those who shall pay income tax have been lowered considerably this year, very few people are exempt from filing a report and paying income tax for the year 1941.

Not having been accustomed to making out income tax returns many individuals will need assistance and Messrs. Curd and Ayers, both capable clerical men, have opened an office in Robersonville to assist those who need advice.
