1-4 c lukewarm water

Mix boiling water, sugar, salt and hortening together and cool to lukewarm. Soften yeast in lukewarm water and stir into first mixture. Add eggs (well beaten) and 4 cups of flour and knead thoroughly. Stir in remainder of flour, but do not knead. Cover and put in refrigerator Shape amount you want into rolls and let double in bulk, about 2 hours, before ready to bake. Leave the re mainder of dough in refrigerator at low temperature until needed. This will keep a week.
