HINTS FOR HOMEMAKERS

SUMMER TIME MEAL SUGGESTIONS

Modern homemakers study nutrition rules and make sure their families get plenty of fresh milk, plenty of fruits and vegetables. They use enriched bread and whole wheat cereals; they use evaporated milk for cooking; they buy vitamin-fortified margarine if their budget does not permit butter. They use dried beans and peas and peanut butter frequently. They serve green and yellow vegetables each day. They use seasonings with a knowing hand, and make a point of serving attractive meals. They should be proud of the job they are doing.

Try these for suppers these hot nights to save time and energy for other things. The whole family will be pleased with this simple menu:

- Jellied Pork
- Sautéed Pineapple
- Crisp Potato Chips
- Buttered Rolls
- Cucumber Salad
- Iced Tea
- Iced Watermelon

To prepare the jellied pork, let the meat simmer until it falls from the bones, season well with salt and pepper, and mold in lemon gelatin. Sauté the pineapple lightly in hot butter to a delicate brown. Slice potatoes thin, dry on a towel, and fry a few at a time in deep fat (400 deg. F.) until crisp and golden brown. For the salad, mix together one cup of diced, peeled cucumbers, one cup cut, cooked vegetables, one tablespoon of finely chopped onion, and 1-4 cup French dressing. Let stand at least one hour to chill in refrigerator before serving on crisp lettuce.

- Refrigerator Rolls**
- 2 c boiling water
 - 1-2 c sugar
 - 1 tsp salt
 - 2 tsp shortening
 - 2 beaten eggs
 - 2 cakes yeast
 - 8 c bread flour (sifted before measuring)
 - 1-4 c lukewarm water

Mix boiling water, sugar, salt and shortening together and cool to lukewarm. Soften yeast in lukewarm water and stir into first mixture. Add eggs (well beaten) and 4 cups of flour and knead thoroughly. Stir in remainder of flour, but do not knead. Cover and put in refrigerator. Shape amount you want into rolls and let double in bulk, about 2 hours, before ready to bake. Leave the remainder of dough in refrigerator at a low temperature until needed. This will keep a week.

Following are some extras to have on hand for unexpected guests when the weather is hot:

- Veal Loaf**
- 1-2 lbs ground veal
 - 1 c cracker crumbs
 - 3 eggs
 - 1-2 c milk
 - 2 tsp salt
 - 1 tsp each chopped onion and parsley
 - 1 small can pimento, cut fine
- Mix all ingredients together and pour into greased loaf tin. Bake at 350° F. for one hour.
- Potato Salad in Aspic**
- 4 c tomato juice cocktail
 - Seasoning to taste
 - Lettuce and Mayonnaise
 - 2 tsp plain gelatin soaked in 4 tbsp cold water
 - Potato salad
 - Hard cooked eggs

Dissolve gelatin over hot water and add to heated tomato juice. Add seasonings. Partially congeal in refrigerator, then add potato salad. Pour into mold. When thoroughly congealed, unmold on platter and garnish with lettuce, slices of egg and mayonnaise, if desired.

- Date and Nut Bread**
- 3-4 c dates
 - 1-2 c boiling water
 - 1-2 tsp soda
 - 1 c corn sirup
 - 1 egg
 - 1-3-4 c flour
 - 1-2 tsp baking powder
 - 1-2 tsp salt
 - 2 tsp shortening
 - 1 c nut meats

Cover dates with boiling water, add soda and let stand until cold. Add corn sirup and egg, blending thoroughly. Add dry ingredients, melt shortening and nuts. Bake 45 to 60 minutes at 375 deg. F.

Homemakers Should Use Fats Every Way Possible

Before selling fats, homemakers should use them in every way possible. Then they should pour surplus fat into clean, wide-mouthed cans, such as a coffee, lard or tomato can. Straining will remove meat and other food particles. Keep the fat in a refrigerator or some other dark cool place until you have a pound or more. Then take what you have to your meat dealer or frozen food locker plant, where you will be paid a few cents a pound for what you have to offer. Don't take the fat to the dealer in a glass container.
