There ought to be no time lost, The Advance thinks, in amending the hospital charter so as to relieve the directors of the Chamber of Commerce of the burden of directing the hospital.

This should be done for two reasons.

In the first place, it should be done for the sake of the hospital. Manifestly a board of directors, elected in the first place because they are in sympathy with the community hospital idea, would be in better position to serve the hospital than a board elected as directors of the Chamber of Commerce whose duties as directors of that organization might at times interfere with their duties as directors of the hospital.

In the second place, it should be done for the sake of the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber of Commerce ought not to be saddled with the direction of any institution as to which there has been waged such a sharp factional fight as that of which the Community Hospital has recently been the center.

News then, The Advance believes, that the proposed amendment to the hospital charter providing for the creation of a new board of directors has been effected will be received with genuine and general relief.
