The result of a \$20,000 advertising campaign was that such a demand for grapefruit was created that the big surplus was completely sold at a most satisfactory price and what had threatened to be a dead loss was turned into a handsome profit.

Having told the story better and in more detail than The Advance has done, the Record inquires as to why the same plan can not be used to advantage to increase the demand for the South's sweet potato crop.

The answer is: It can when there is a Southern Sweet Potato Cooperative Exchange with 6,000 members.
