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Making Up for Blunder

Ever since the announcement by this newspaper immediately after the death of President Harding that The Advance had arranged, during the remainder of the absence in Europe of Mr. David Lawrence, to receive a daily Washington dispatch from Robert T. Small, The Advance has been quietly negotiating with the Consolidated Press Association with a view to compensating its readers for their disappointment by the failure of the Small dispatches to materialize.

We learned, in the first place, that our failure to receive the Small dispatches while Mr. Lawrence was in Europe or on his way home on the Leviathan was due to a misunderstanding on the part of one of the Consolidated Press Association's relay stations.

Having that much settled, The Advance hastened to accept the suggestion of the Consolidated Press Association that the Small dispatches be now accepted for such a period as this newspaper promised its readers in the first place that it would receive and print them. The fact that the new service begins today, just when there are so many events of wide importance to be covered that Mr. Lawrence's daily dispatch particularly needs supplementing, is highly pleasing to us and, we hope, will prove equally as gratifying to our readers.

Two school buildings, we believe, are not ready for occupancy in Raleigh at this time, but that fact did not delay the opening of the schools in the capital city, though it involves carrying on school work for the time being in temporary quarters and under rather trying conditions.

The use of the relay system in Elizabeth City will, no doubt, involve rather trying difficulties, but not enough to compensate for delaying the opening of schools till October without any certainty that the new high school building will be ready for use by that date.
