In the October 7 game, with Shawkey, Collins, Quinn and Rogers pitching for the Yankees, George Burnas connected for two singles a double and triple, while Frank Sny-der, the Glant catcher, made four singles. Earlier in the sama inning with Jack Quinn pitching for the Yanks, Young drove out a double.


