Travelling Faster Than Anything on Wheels Has Ever Done Before Tommy Milton's Victory at Charlotte Made Huge Surprise to Spectators

Starting alone in a speedster, he was seen in the distance, travelling 250 consecutive miles faster than anything on wheels had ever travelled before. Tommy Milton, of the movie colony at Beverly Hills, Los Angeles, victor of the racing used and the humming track, won the inaugural classic of the Charlotte Speedway in the dawn of a new day after a long and hard day's work.
