

Hundred Democrats In North Carolina House

Two Republicans in Lower Branch of State Legislature and Three in Senate for 1925 Session Which Will be Held at the State Capital in Month of January

Raleigh, Nov. 18.—There will be 100 Democrats, including one woman, and 20 Republicans, in the North Carolina House of Representatives, and 47 Democrats and three Republicans in the Senate at the 1925 session, according to a list of members of the general assembly elected on Nov. 4 compiled by Henry M. London, legislative Reference Librarian. The list was made public here today.

The three Republican Senators will come from the twenty-fourth, thirtieth and thirty-third districts. The twenty-third district, normally Republican, went Democratic this year for the first time since its formation in 1892. The thirty-third, normally Republican, went Democratic two years ago, but reentered the Republican column this year. There were three Republicans in the expiring general assembly.

The Republican House membership shows a gain of eleven over two years ago when nine were elected. Two years ago, Polk, Tyrell, Surry, Graham, Mitchell, Sampson, Watauga, Wilkes and Yadkin counties elected Republican representatives. This year Polk, Tyrell and Surry went Democratic. The Republican this year carried the following counties that went Democratic two years ago:

Brunswick, Catawba, Cherokee (where Mrs. Giles Covell, Democrat, was beaten), Davie, Johnson (with two members), Lincoln, Madison, Randolph, Henderson, Swain, Alexander, Avery and Clay.

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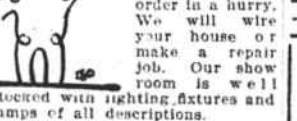


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
