

ONLY ONCE DID UNDER 600 WIN

And That Was Back in 1915 When Philadelphia Grabbed Pennant from Boston With .592.

New York, Nov. 25.—In all the years of National League history the championship has never been won but once with a percentage lower than 600. In 1915 Philadelphia grabbed it from Boston with a percentage of .592. Boston was 540.

This was the year in which Pat Moran managed the Philadelphia team and the fact that he won the first pennant for Philadelphia excited him so in the opinion of Philadelphia fans that they referred to him as another miracle man in baseball. George Stallings was the first miracle man when he sent his Boston team to the front in 1914 after it had been taking the dust July 4.

The lowest margin actually touched in 600 was by New York and Brooklyn. In 1900 the Brooklyn won the pennant with a percentage of 603 and in 1920 they won with 604 while in 1922 the Giants finished with the same figure. After that 608 is the best which fell to New York in 1924. Then Brooklyn with 610 in 1916.

The American League has a record for under 600 competition that makes that of the National League take a back seat. In 1908, a year which stirred with a lot of excitement in all major league baseball, the Detroit captured the pennant with .588. Everybody marveled about the closeness of the competition and Hugh Jennings shed a flock of freckles trying to worry along with his troubles. The Cleveland were the runners up and their figures were 584.

The next best was the Boston figure of 591 in 1916 and after that came Boston again with 595 in 1918. Of course the season terminated abruptly in 1918 because of the "work or fight" order, but the Boston had to play all of the time to keep the lead they started with. The Giants in the National League who were thought to be probable winners, lost their lead that year after they had run like wild fire, because some of the players got so fussed up over the war.

The next best figure in the American League was that of Washington this year with 597. New York was second with 586 which was exhibit B in the American

The handicappers are the managers and the owners and usually they manage to handicap themselves as well as the players. When owners bid in where managers fear to tread there is always trouble. The moment a club owner feels that he knows all about his baseball club he is pretty sure to be headed for the tail end of the league.

The unconscious handicapping of the American League race by its managers, assisted by its owners, is one of the rare things of baseball that cannot be explained but it has given the American League artisans a chance to crow time and again as to the relative value of the two competitions.
