OFFICERS OCCUPY MONEDA PALACE

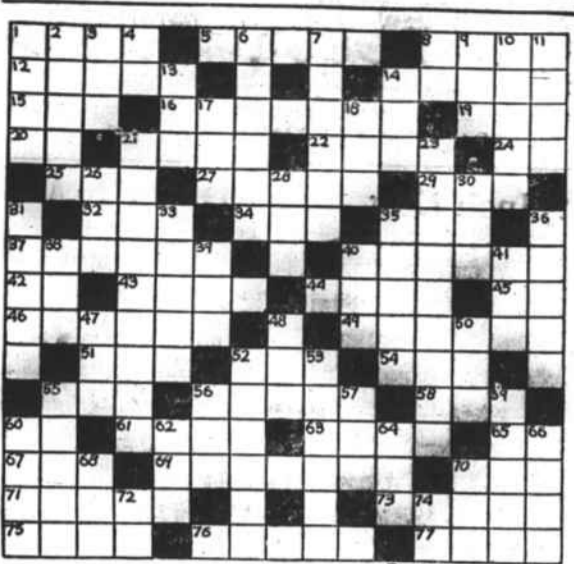
