ARTIST TELLS HOW THOSE HE PAINTS BEHAVE

Men Have Their Portraits Painted Because They are Urged But Women Are Keen for the Ordeal

THEY'RE DIFFERENT

Not That Men Aren't Vain, But They Worry About Their Hair While Women Think of Jewels

Boston, Feb. 4.—Women like to have their portraits painted, but men do not.

This is the opinion of John Young-Hunter, a Scotchman who is a medalist of the Royal Academy and who has painted many of America's and Britain's great. Men usually have their portraits painted because their families "have pushed them into it," women because they have actually persuaded their families to push them into it, he said.

As to which sex displays the more vanity during and after the process of painting a picture, Mr. Young-Hunter is doubtful. "They're so different," he explained. "A man usually is concerned about his hair, no matter how small an amount he may have, and his moustache. Usually, nothing else matters. Women sometimes like to have their robes of pearls made a little larger than they really are."

One well-known banker, however, emphatically urged the artist not to paint the wrinkles in his coat sleeves.

Children and very old persons are the easiest to paint, Mr. Young-Hunter finds. "Children know so little and old folks know so much that they do not embarrass the artist with criticisms and suggestions and are not overworked over the outcome of his efforts."

One disadvantage in painting children, however, is that their parents are so hard to satisfy. No artist could make them as beautiful as their parents believe they are.

Husbands also sometimes are critical. One woman looked at her finished portrait and exclaimed, "Am I really as lovely as that?" Her husband's comment was, "That isn't my little Mary."

A seemingly harmless bit of flattery on the part of their friends sometimes tends to make men and women dissatisfied with the pictures of themselves that they themselves have admired. It is a trifle saying, but lots of folks believe it when their friends say, "It doesn't do you justice."

Besides his artistic ability the portrait painter must possess some of the qualities of a diplomat. Mr. Young-Hunter does not permit his subjects to see their pictures before they are finished, and sometimes it requires considerable tact to hold off the anxious captain of finance or industry who is used to having things his own way.

The Scotch artist works rapidly. He usually completes a portrait in three or four sittings of from an hour and a half to two hours each. He has painted under varying conditions, the portrait of a well known figure in American life having been done

France and Poland Claim The Discoverer of Radium

Madame Curie, Who Received French Citizenship When Married, and Is Known as the Most Notable Woman in France, Quiet, Unassuming and Unobtrusive

Paris, Feb. 4.—Two countries, France and Poland, contend for the allegiance of Marie Sklodowska Curie, known to all the world as Madame Pierre Curie, co-discoverer with her husband of one of the most treasured of science's secrets—radium.

But Madame Curie herself, though a little touch of homesickness takes her back to Warsaw each summer, received French citizenship when she married Pierre Curie in 1895 and feels that she belongs to the land that holds his "resting grave."

Since she has chosen French nationality there is not a Frenchman alive who would refuse her the title of "the most notable woman in France."

Madame Curie works and lives in the street which the city of Paris has named after her husband. Number One Pierre Curie Street, is one of the newer buildings belonging to the scientific schools of the University of Paris. It is a raw-colored, ugly building, surrounded by half-finished laboratories and muddy excavations.

Mme. Curie came into a small waiting room from her laboratory, quietly and unobtrusively slipping through a partly opened door.

"Mme. Curie?" "I am Mme. Curie."

She sat down in one of the little chairs, her interviewer taking one directly opposite. Folding her hands she waited, face expressionless, but with a gleam in the eyes that seemed to say:

"Now, young man, no nonsense. Keep to the point and we'll get this over with."

A minute passed while she stared the interviewer out of countenance, and into forgetting what he had come for. Her eyes shone steadily, unblinkingly through her

spectacles. The straight, severely-cut black dress seemed to disappear into the background, the odd, old-fashioned shoes were forgotten. Mme. Curie has a pair of keen eyes gleaming like radium in the dark, but life glowed like a white-hot flame in her brain.

"What do you want to see me for?" Mme. Curie seemed to have startled herself in speaking so suddenly.

"It is considered that you are the most distinguished woman in France, Mme. Curie. We are collecting a series of articles on the most notable women of all countries."

Mme. Curie was wholly unmoved.

"Were you interested in the study of radium's properties before you met your husband, Mme. Curie?"

"I think that is not a good question that you ask me. I think it is improper I should speak of those things, because my husband is no more alive now. I never talk so about myself, but only give consultations on scientific things. At this hour now I give information of that kind. There is something written about my work and I will give such things to you. It is all I can do."
