NEW YORK COTTON
New York, July 29. (AP)—An opening advance in the cotton market today which carried the price of December contracts up to 19.19 or about 5 to 8 cents net higher, was followed by reactions.

The failure of prospects for further shows in the belt to operate more buying power evidently disappointed holders of contracts and there was probably some selling for a reaction as well as speculation on the decline later. December sold off to 19.01 or 11 points to the lower.

The mid-afternoon market was within 2 or 3 points of the lowest.

(AP)—Speculators for the advance continued to press their advantage in today's market but heavy work and realizing sales and sporadic bear selling impaired irregularly to the price movement call money, after renewing at 3 3/4 per cent, advanced to 4 as banks called loans to meet the heavy month end demand for funds.

With brokers' loans about \$500,000,000 above the total at this time last year many operators inclined to proceed cautiously, although an increase in the Federal Reserve ratios indicated no strain on the credit situation.
