The Rally at Mackey's Ferry.

It being the exception and not the rule, last Thursday was a fine day, and the picnic and mass meeting at Pleasant Grove was one of the greatest White Supremacy rallies ever held in this section.
There were about 3,000 men, women and children from this and adjoining counties assembled on that occasion who were entertained by impassioned speeches from Hon. E. V. Cox, of Pitt county and Wm. M. Bond, of Edenton.

The brass band from Edenton and the military company of this town were present and took parts in the program of the day.
The meeting was called to order by Hon. S. B. Spruill, of Plymouth, who presented Hon. W. M. Bond, who for nearly two hours discussed with telling effect the Constitutional Amendment. Mr. Bond is Chairman of the Democratic Executive Committee of Chowan county, and is always listened to with interest and pleasure by our people. He was often interrupted by enthusiastic applause, and when he closed the enthusiasm was tremendous.

At the close of his speech Mr. Bond introduced the Hon. E. V. Cox, of Pitt. Mr. Cox is a speaker of no mean ability, and although a Republican he is broad-minded and courageous enough to champion the cause of White Supremacy. His reasons why every white man, regardless of party affiliations, should rally under the white man's banner and rescue North Carolina from negro domination, were strong, and it has been proven that the seeds sown that day have borne much fruit.

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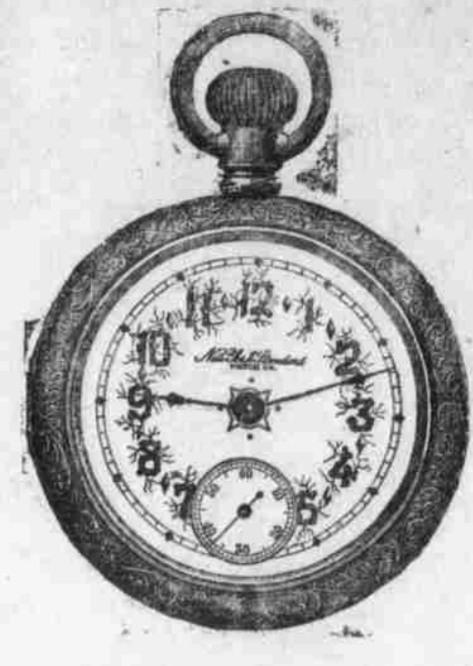
