Mr. Singleton Takes Oath.

The sentiment of the people is that the affairs of the county will be in safe hands with Mr. Singleton, Sheriff Blount and Mr. Spruill.

There being only one aspirant for the office of Register of Deeds, Mr. F. R. Johnston, he was endorsed by a unanimous vote.
