

Few Practical Suggestions That Will Be of Much Assistance to the Poultry Keeper.



Wisconsin. For success in poultry keeping it is necessary to have a suitable house which will protect the fowls from inclement weather and from their natural enemies.

It must be remembered that from the standpoint of the hen, appearance makes very little difference, but the house must be so built and so arranged that it will be a comfortable place for the hens to live; otherwise they will not thrive and production will not be satisfactory. On many farms the hens are not provided with a house constructed especially for of them for all time to come. Court them, but are housed in an old building originally made for some other purpose. As a rule this sort of a

house is not economical, for, unless it is constructed especially for hens, it will seldom be found possible to reconstruct it in such a way as to make economical production possible. Poultry houses should be located where it is dry and well drained. If the ground is not naturally dry, it should be ditched and drained artificially, for poultry will not thrive in a house when the floor is constantly






