In the matter of Drainage District to be known as "Washington County Drainage District No. 4."

A petition having been filed by A. E. Rice and John L. Roper Lumber Company to establish a Drainage District to be known as "Washington County Drainage District Number 4," all land owners who own or claim any land within the proposed boundaries thereof are hereby notified to be and appear before me at the Court House in Plymouth, N. C., on the 1st day of April, 1913, at Noon, then and there to show cause, if any they have, why the prayer of the said petition should not be granted. The boundary of the said District is described as follows:

"Beginning at the intersection of the center line of the Pungo River drainage canal with the center line of the Norfolk Southern Railroad in Washington Co., N. C., and running Northwardly along the center line of said railroad to the Northern boundary of the Pungo River Drainage District; thence, Southeastwardly along said Drainage District boundary to the West shore of Pungo Lake; thence, Southwardly along the West shore of said lake to the land of The Interstate Coöperage Company; thence, Southwardly along the West line of the land of the said The Interstate Coöperage Co. to the Southwest corner of said land; thence, Eastwardly along the South line of the lands of said The Interstate Coöperage Company a distance of one hundred and twenty rods; thence, Southwardly parallel to the Norfolk Southern Railroad a distance of one and one-eighth miles; thence, Westwardly at a right angle to the before described line a distance of one-half mile; thence, Southwardly to the Northwest of the land of Silas Holton and thence, Southwardly along the West line of said land to the center of the Pungo River Drainage Canal; thence, Northwestwardly along the center line of said canal to the place of beginning, the above described tract being a part of the Pungo River Drainage District Number one.
