

A LANDSLIDE

TWO MORE YEARS OF DEMOCRATIC RULE.

Sheriff Reid Will Continue to Carry the Little Leather Satchel; Holmes Will Handle Our Finances, And Coggins Goes to Raleigh.

What was feared to be one of the closest and tightest elections Washington County has ever had proved to be a veritable Democratic Landslide. Grave fears were felt by the Democrats several times during the campaign, and at one time during election day things appeared to be discouragingly bilious, but persistent work and the clean methods of the campaign caused Democrats to rally to the flag superbly.

Two hundred and fourteen straight ballots were cast in Plymouth Township against ninety eight Republican. The lowest majority in this precinct was 117 something unprecedented during the political life of the county.

Sheriff Reid lead ticket by a majority of over two hundred, while Register of Deeds Johnston and Treasurer Holmes crowded that mark closely.

The election passed off quietly and friendly.

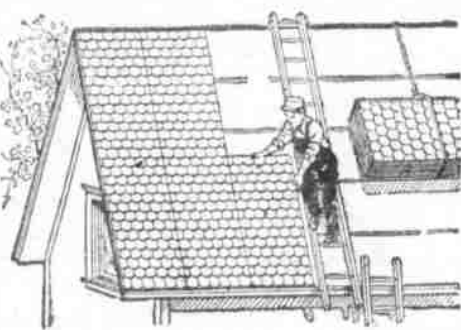
