How to Register if Sick or From Home?

If you are sick and cannot attend to register in person, have some reliable friend secure a card from me for you, and I will advise him how to have you fill

it in and return it.

If you are in this county, but your home is elsewhere, you can register by applying to me and having your card certified to and then sending it to the Registrar of your voting precinct in care of the Sheriff of your county. In either instance this must be done in time to reach its destination before June 5th 1917. The absentee must make his application to the clerk in person. It cannot be handled by mail or certified to by a registrar.

Remember, all male persons who are 21 years old, and have not reached their 31st birthday, must register, under penalty of imprisonment. I am trying to save you from this humiliation, but YOU MUST DO YOUR PART, AND DO IT AT ONCE.

Register For Selective Draft.

Tuesday, June 5th, 1917, has been appointed as the day to Register for the Selective Draft for the United States Army.

All male persons between the ages of 21 and 30 years are required to present themselves at their respective voting precincts on this day and register their names, under penalty of severe imprisonment, without appeal, if they fail to do so.

No one can be excused. Sick or absentees will make application to the Clerk of the County Board immediately for cards so as to have them in the Registrars' hands before the day of Registration.

All who are near this age, or who have the appearance of being of this age, will provide themselves with properly verified certificates of birth and keep them on their person, for they will be demanded of you and unless you are able to prove your age you may be arrested and imprisoned.

Registration books will be open on day of registration from 7 o'clock a. m., until 9 o'clock p. m.
