All who are near this age, or who have the appearance of being of this age, will pe vide themselves with properly verified certificates of birth and keep them on their pe son, for they will be demanded of you and unless you are able to prove your age you may be arrested and imprisoned.

Registration books will be open on day of registration from 7 o'clock a. m., until o'clock p. m.
