We learn that he has purchased a large laundry, ice and fuel business in Hendersonville, and while we hope for and predict his success there, we realize that his sacrifice here has been great, for Mr. Latham has always been a busy man and his interests here were many. He is the owner of a large farm and also of the Plymouth Light & Ice plant, which he is now offering for sale, as well as his nice residence on Main Street and other property in the city.

Since reaching his majority Mr. Latham has most acceptably filled the position as agent for the A. C. L. R. Co., and then as Postmaster here. For the past 17 years, or ever since its organization, has been cashier of the Bank of Plymouth, which position he resigned to make his change of residence.
