**HEALTHY WHEAT
SEED ESSENTIAL.**

Highton, D. C., Aug. 22—Sound, healthy seed is the first requisite for a large crop. The farmer who increases his crop by using the best seed is the one who is most successful. What varieties of wheat will give the best results? The department has seen that only the best seed is planted. What has been an equally true of seed for the year which the department hopes to see larger than usual next year.

The farmer who saves seed from his own wheat is satisfactory so far as quantity and general condition are concerned, but he should lose no time in getting into shape for storage until the fall. The fanning mill is the farmer's best friend in this task. The farmer, by all means, should have such a mill, and if he has not and is unable to buy one, should borrow or rent his neighbor's mill, or see if a farmer can buy one. A fanning mill will clean seed, smut and shriveled seed, and leaves only plump kernels, which every one of which may be depended upon to produce a thrifty crop.

After it is cleaned, however, seed should be treated in order that smut may be prevented. Smut is likely to be prevented by seed treatment, but the use of the fanning mill assists materially in improving the seed grown from seed known to be free from smut.

The farmer who depends on outside sources for his seed should buy his seed as soon after harvest as possible, as at this time prices are likely to be lowest. If the farmer delays, his neighbors may dispose of all their surplus and he may be forced to buy seed grown under conditions entirely different from his own. If a farmer patronizes a seedman he should insist on getting seed grown as this section as possible.

Seed affected by disease, carelessness will usually disclose the presence of stinking smut in

wheat is indicated by the odor and the presence of scab by the appearance of the kernels. Purchased seed should, of course, be cleaned and treated for the destruction of the spores of disease-producing fungi. If the examination shows this to be necessary.

In choosing varieties of wheat the farmer should be guided by the experiences of his neighbors and the advice of his State Experiment Station. This is true also of rye, but there are available fewer varieties of rye than of wheat. The stations can furnish comparative statistics on the yields and behavior of a number of varieties of the two cereals.

After the grain farmer has procured a supply of satisfactory seed he should store it carefully so that it will keep in good condition and will be safe from the depredations of rats, mice and insects. This which are supposedly rat proof are available on practically all farms and it will pay farmers to see that they are kept in good condition to keep out the rodents.

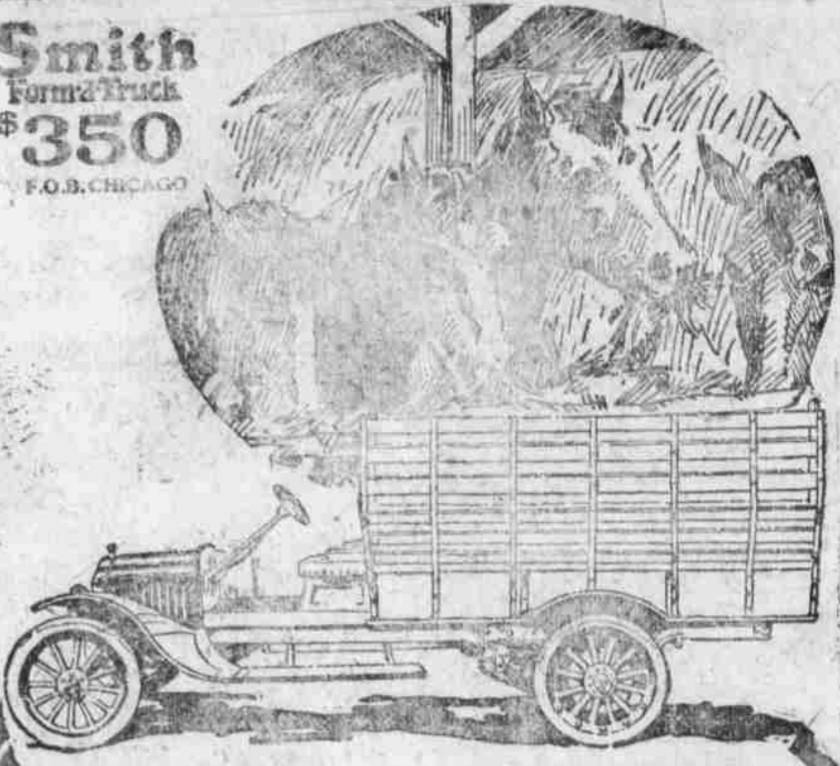
