CAMPAIGN FOR WINTER CROPS, ETC.

Realizing the seriousness of the general agricultural conditions thru out the country at the present time, the agricultural people of the different departments and experiment stations and the field extension workers are making a hard drive thruout the entire country to tell and show our farmers their needs and give them specific instructions on winter cover crops. Washington County should be in the lead in agricultural work thruout the State tho in reality she is not, yet we are doing some good work agriculturally in this county and we hope to soon make it the best county in the state.

There are many things that are of vital importance to our state and our nation as well as our county at this time, and thru the efforts of the Extension Service, of which a number of the leading counties over the state enjoy, there will be a campaign carried on over the county to give some specific information on the following subjects: Winter Cover Crops, Wheat, for home use; Seed Selection and Storage for winter. Permanent Pastures, and Poultry and Hogs for the average farm in the south. These different topics will be discussed thoroughly at the meetings over the county and it is hoped that every farmer will go out and take a part in this discussion, as we will not be able to effectively cover the county in a farm to farm visit, and it therefore becomes necessary that we ask you to gather at your local school houses for these meetings, of which you will be sent a personal notice. Also we hope that you will bring as many others as you can.

Mr. S. G. Rubinow, of the Extension Service of Raleigh, will be with me on this county campaign and it is our aim to visit as many farms between meetings as we can, tho it will be impossible to do so on every farm, and we cordially ask that you attend these meetings. Meetings will be held at the following places and at the following hours, we will discuss this work at these meetings if there is only one man there, but we hope that we may have an opportunity to talk to at least 3,000 Washington County Farmers in this work.

Marketing the surplus crops, whether cotton, corn, peanuts, or any farm product is of interest to every farmer, the Extension Service at Raleigh, are working out some important data on this work now, and we hope to within a short time be able to organize marketing clubs or associations all over the state and Washington County. Come out and give your views on this matter, they are of importance to the work and to you.

I make a personal appeal to every man, woman and child in Washington County to give this matter your serious thought and ask you to attend these meetings wherever it is possible for you to do so. And look up the date and place of the nearest meeting to you, and come; also bring your neighbor with you.
