The first five per cent. of those selected to go to war from this county left on the 1:33 N. S. train for Columbia, S. C. last Friday. Those men were W. W. Ayers, Eli S. Phelps, Dack O. Patrick and Walter H. Spruill.

At 11 o'clock the stores closed and a large number of our people assembled at the Majestic Theatre to bid those who go to defend them God speed.

After a prayer for their safety was offered by Rev. Mr. Myers, pastor of the Baptist Church, short addresses were made by Supt. J. W. Darden, Hon. A. W. Swain, Prof. J. W. Norman and Capt. G. W. Harney. Then, through Mr. Darden, comfort bags were presented them by the Plymouth Red Cross Auxiliary, and boxes of lunch, sufficient to last them to camp, were contributed by the Camp Fire Girls of the town.

Quite a crowd escorted them to the train and we feel sure they left with lighter hearts, knowing that those at home will ever be thinking of and praying for their success and ultimate safe return to those they love and who love them.

### Red Cross.

The Red Cross Auxiliary will hold a special business meeting in the Red Cross rooms, Harney building, on Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 18th, at 3 o'clock.

The members are urged to be present. The chairmen of the different committees, the Secretary and Treasurer will please be prepared to give a full report of what has been done since the last meeting, held in August.

Of the 1,000 comfort bags and 500 pajamas which the Southern division of the Red Cross has been asked to contribute to the various army camps throughout the country, Plymouth's quota is eight comfort bags, four pajamas and as much jam as we can furnish. This is a small apportionment, yet, unless our women put their "bits" together and help to fill these bags, we shall fail to do what is expected of us. Two are being filled. We hope that our members will come to the meeting Tuesday determined that the other six bags shall be filled, and that our boys shall have enough jam to go around. The pajamas are made and ready to ship.

This is a national organization and we hope that every one in Plymouth, whether a member of the Red Cross or not, will contribute when an opportunity like this offers itself. Let us bear in mind that, no matter how much we give, our gift cannot equal that of a single boy in khaki, who offers his life on the battle field of France.

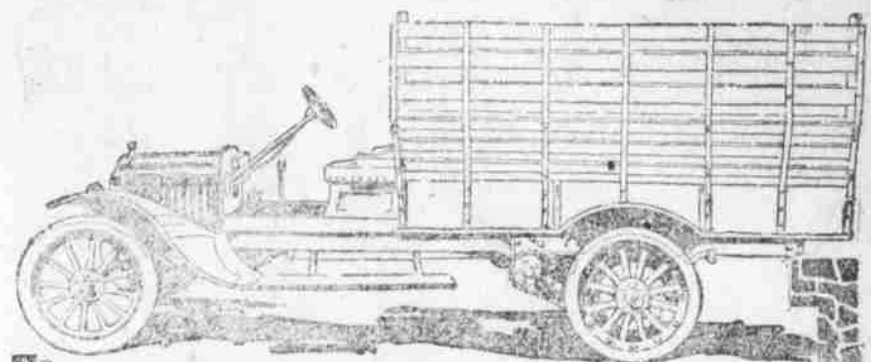
