We firmly believe in labor being properly paid, but labor troubles seldom occur except through the over paid classes. And just now, when our country is in vital need of their services, and when many of them are drawing more pay than they ever dreamed of earning, it seems little short of treason for the big organizations in our shipyards, navy-yards, coal mines and railroads to be causing trouble about bigger pay, when they know it is not only helping our enemies to fight us, but is running up prices and working a double hardship upon their less paid brothers whose wages depends upon profits.

We do not believe in retaliation, unless it be in returning good in kind, but suppose these men who are now getting from \$5.00 to \$12.00 per day for eight hours work should be drawn by conscript and have continuous service, away from home and loved ones, as so many just as good men are doing to-day, for \$33.00 per month?

In calling attention to Red Cross Week, beginning Monday, Oct. 8th, Mrs. Jas. W. Norman, Chairman Plymouth Auxiliary, makes a strong appeal to the children to make sacrifices for it, which if heeded will be very beautiful, and suggests how this may be done. She also asks the parents to encourage their children in this, and we add some suggestions as to how this can easily be done, using as examples what some others are doing. One way is to contribute an amount equal to your living expenses for one week, or even one day. This may be a little hard for some of the really poorer people, but your sacrifice in doing this will be insignificant compared with that of those who are fighting for you, and will be no sacrifice at all to those whose income is greater than their living expenses. Another way is to count every cent you spend next week for what is not positively necessary and give a like amount; or, suppose you fill one or more comfort bags; they cost about \$2.50 or \$3.00 each. Those who have boys in the army, no matter how poor they are, are going to do their part in addition to this, and certainly those who have no boys there should feel grateful, and consider it a pleasant privilege to do all they can for those who are doing so much for them.

Of course the above is only suggestions which are not unreasonable, but smaller amounts will help to lighten the hardships of the boys at the front, so don't wait to be called upon, but send in to the Red Cross Auxiliary whatever amount you feel like contributing.
