

**GARDEN WORK FOR NOVEMBER.**

During the latter part of October and the first part of November it is a good idea to mulch the asparagus bed with stable manure and to clean up the garden and scatter manure over all unused soil. In the mountain region, around November 5th, it is time to plant rhubarb. This is done by planting the roots 4 feet apart each way, and 3 to 4 inches deep in the drill. The Victoria variety is recommended. Palmetto asparagus could also be planted at this time by placing the crowns 6 to 10 inches deep and 18 inches apart in rows 4 feet apart. On November 15th, cabbage like the early Jersey Wakefield variety, may be transplanted from the seed bed. On November 25th strawberries should be planted in rows 15 inches by 8 1-2 feet. Varieties recommended are the Klondyke, Lady Thompson, and Missionary. About this time, also, and along until the first week in December, seed catalogues should be ordered and studied carefully for the purpose of selecting out the best varieties for the coming spring. Plans for operations during the coming year should also be made at this time.

It is a gymnasium where spines are straightened and stiffened, chests are expanded and muscles hardened. It is a power plant of patriotism. It is a quarry wherein are wrought foundation stones for the Temple of the Republic. It is an anvil where plow-shares are beaten into swords for the hands of freemen. It is a chain to bind North and South together across Mason and Dixon's line. It is a new fraternity of fellowship between Virginia and Pennsylvania. It is an assembly ground for the Johnny-Yanks.

"Camp Lee is a field of the cloth of Khaki. It is the triumph of co-ordination and co-operation. It is the union of obedience and freedom sought in five thousand years of battle against tyranny and anarchy. It is an army of selected soldiers, chosen for fitness to serve. It is a sinew to tighten Uncle Sam's kindly hand into a terrible fist. It is a symbol of the efficiency of government by the people. It is a guarantee that free government shall not perish from the earth. It is a lighthouse of Liberty. It is a school of safety. It is a college of courage. It is a university of War.

"Camp Lee is an armed guard round American institutions and American rights. It is the latest gathering of the descendants of heroic generations—Old Hickories, Montezuma Conquerors, Continentals, Federals, Confederates, Rough Riders. "Camp Lee is a rainbow spanning the storm clouds of the last world war. It is the red glow of the dawning of enduring peace. It is an emblem of the efficient righteousness that defies unjust might.
