A general outline of the specifications for said light ing system as provided for in the said Resolution is as follows:

A good crude oil engine of sufficient capacity to furnish light for the said town and its inhabitants, together with dynamo sufficient to generate current for approximately thirty street lights and approximately eight hundred lights for residences and business purposes with storage batteries sufficient to run with storage batteries sufficient to run-said lights for twenty-four hours with-out the engine; switchboard, poles and wire sufficient to carry the cur-rent into all parts of the said town, together with brackets or arms for ap proximately thirty street lights, power house complete, and all other fixtures and appliances sufficient to provide a complete and sufficient lighting sys-tem for said town.

It was provided in the said Resolution that the Board could not consider any bids in excess of Ten Thousand Dollars. It was also provided in said Resolution that this notice should be published in the "Roanoke Beacon," a newspaper published in Washington County, during the month of December, 1917, and that the Board would receive said bids at their regular monthly meeting the first Monday night in January, 1918, at which time the hide will be an advantaged. the bids will be opened and considered by the Board. 
