Who Are Liable to Draft.

In a letter to Exemption Boards Gov. Bickett gives as his opinion that no farmer or farm laborer in the second draft will be sent to camp before July 15th, so that they may proceed with their farm work.

This, however, does not include the deferred percentage of first quota of colored men who are liable to be called at any time.

Should be Careful.

It has been reported to the U. S. Food Administration by merchants of other towns, that the merchants of Plymouth are selling to farmers more flour than the law prescribes.

Flour cannot be sold in lots greater than 48 lbs. to farmers, and 24 lbs. to others, and then only in connection with a like amount of cereal substitutes, the exception being that if the farmer certifies that he has raised and is using corn meal or other substitutes in like amounts, he can buy up to 48 lbs. of flour without the substitutes.

GARDEN NOTES.

Plant the Stone Tomato for Canning.

I. Do not select low, wet natural places for tomatoes. If you do you will likely have wilt. If you spray tomatoes every few weeks with Bordeaux Mixture it will prevent blight. The increase in yield, size and color of fruit will repay you for the extra trouble.

II. Be sure to plant a succession of beans all along. Get the stringless Green Pod for the bush bean and the Kentucky Wonder for a climbing bean. If a person wants to plant for market it is much cheaper to get these beans by the quart than small packages.

III. For canning purposes plant several rows of okra and about three plantings of corn to go with tomatoes for soup mixture. This is in great demand.

IV. Cultivate your garden often; do not let a crust form on the land, and in case of drought shallow cultivation will preserve the moisture.

V. Plant running butter beans around the garden fence, and any little corner or spot of land that is available put in bush butter beans or peas. Beans and peas are very nourishing; they are tissue builders.

Our President says the eyes of the world are turned to the people of the South and we must all serve by doing our "bit", even tho it be a small garden that we cultivate.
