The delegates present were made chairmen of their respective churches and instructed to return home and at once call a meeting and arouse their members to the great duty of the hour, and in churches where local speakers were not available to call upon Mr. W. F. Midgett to provide one. The church not having a speaker who can explain the War-Saving Stamp should notify Mr. Midgett at once. It was decided that this organization meet once a month, time and place to be left with the chairman.
