Plymouth Chapter.

The Red Cross rooms were opened for regular work on Wednesday afternoon at Blount's Hall, the new headquarters. A cordial welcome for every one who will come for work or information. Regular hours, two to five, every afternoon except Saturdays.

A \$100,000,000 War Fund Campaign is to be conducted by the National Red Cross during the week of May 20th. Mr. T. W. Saell is to be Campaign Director for the Chapter, and Mr. John W. Darden Publicity Manager. It is confidently expected that these gentlemen will take Plymouth safely "over the top."

The Graded School has completed its quota (\$55.00) and organized a Junior Auxiliary, with Miss Carrie Smith Chairman.

Plymouth is responding generously to the appeal for clothing for the Belgians and French. The box will remain open until Tuesday, to give every one a last chance to contribute.

The \$16.34 contributed for the relief of the storm sufferers at Atlantic has been forwarded to Mr. Noe, of Wilmington, who has charge of these funds.

Lunches were provided for the eighteen selectmen who entrained for Camp Jackson last week. Comfort Kits were also provided for those going from Plymouth. Creswell and Roper providing kits for the ten men going from their respective chapters.

The Finance Committee desires to thank the donors for the voluntary contributions to the Red Cross recently received, a total of \$34.00. Will not others follow? Wool and cotton continues to advance in price. A small purchase makes a large hole in a treasury almost empty, and funds are necessary to keep the workers busy. They should be kept steadily "at it," now, especially while the great battles are on in France. Thousands of garments, bandages and dressings are needed daily. What if your boy or your neighbor's boy should lose his life because of a lack of these?

Notice is given that upon the return of said summons, petitioner will ask that the same be referred to an Examiner and that its title be registered and assured.

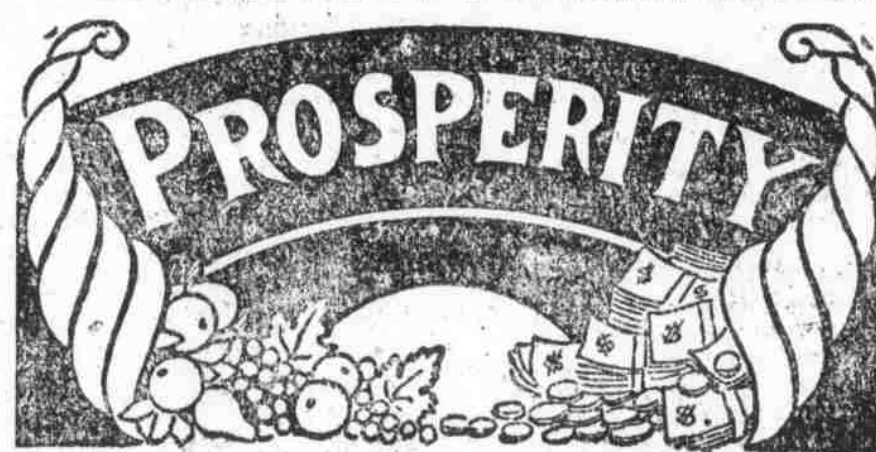

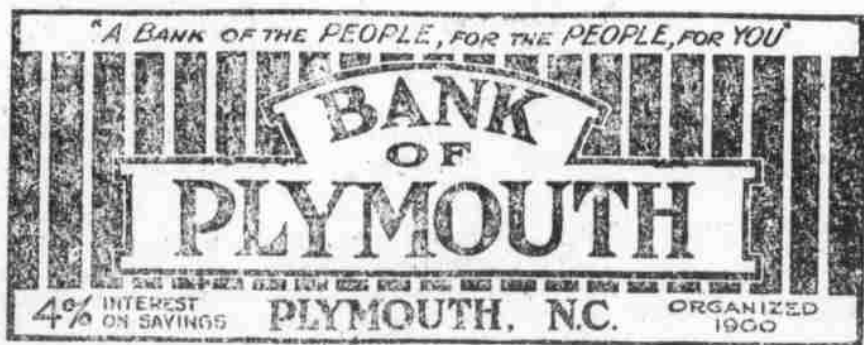
