NOTICE OF ELECTION.

Notice is hereby given to the voters in Creswell High School District, in Washington County, North Carolina, that pursuant to an order of the Board of County Commissioners of said county made and entered on the 3rd day of June, 1918, there will be an election held in said school district on Friday, the 16th day of August, 1918, to ascertain whether the voters in said school district are in favor of issuing bonds in the sum of \$15,000.00, for the purpose of building a school house and furnishing the same with suitable equipment, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, and run twenty years, the tax to be levied to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund to pay the principal and interest on said bonds when they fall due to be 25 cents on the hundred dollars and 75 cents on the poll. Said election will be held in the usual place of holding elections in said school district.

A new registration for said election has been ordered and will be made. J. F. Belanga has been appointed registrar and Jim Stuart and H. W. Bateman judges for said election.

At said election those favoring the issuance of said bonds and the levying of a special tax shall vote a ballot on which shall be printed the words "For Schoolhouse Bonds", and those who are opposed shall vote a ballot on which shall be printed "Against Schoolhouse Bonds". 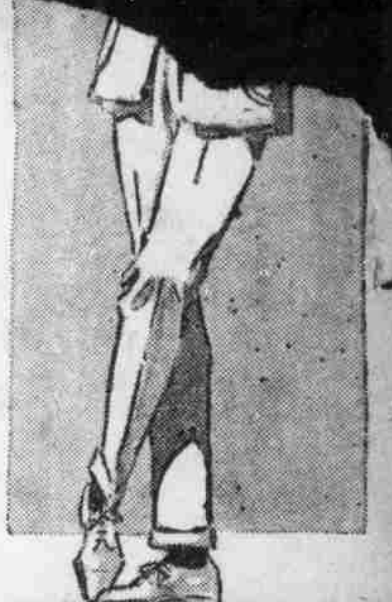
