Grape Jelly.

4 lbs. grapes, 1 lb water; Crush grapes and boil for 20 minutes, press thru coarse cloth and allow to drain thru a flannel bag. Bring juice to boiling point and to each cup of juice add 3 4 cup honey.

Continue boiling until jelly point is reached. Skim, pour into hot glasses and seal.
