All Over 18 and Not Yet 46 Years Old Must Register.

According to the new registration regulations prescribed by the President under authority of the act of Congress, all men who are under 46 years of age will be required to register on September 12th. The official bulletin just received at the local boards contains the following paragraph: "Persons Required To Register. All male persons who shall have attained their eighteenth birthday and shall not have attained their forty-sixth birthday on or before the day set for registration by the President must register."

CAN REGISTER BY PROXY IF ILL.

Washington, Sept. 4.—Provisions for the registering of men within the age limits of the new draft who may be ill on September 12 were announced today by Provost Marshal General Crowder. Any man who is unable to appear for registration may send some one else to the draft board and where the board is satisfied the case is bona fide the representative will be deputized to make out the card and the registrar's report.

The word "sick" will be written on the card, which on being delivered to the registrant must be mailed or taken to the local board having jurisdiction.

CLUB NOTES.

GRAPE JUICE

Crush grapes and let stand in wooden or enameled vessel one hour. Drip through a cloth; the thicker the cloth the clearer the juice. Put juice in kettle and bring to boiling point. Pour into bottles or jats and seal.

CANNING PIMENTOS

Gather peppers early in the morning—handle carefully. Remove seeds by cutting around each stem with a sharp paring knife so as to remove inside partitions. To peel, place peppers in very hot oven (6 to 10 minutes) until the skin blisters and cracks. Be careful they do not burn. Remove skin with sharp, slender knife. Flatten peppers and pack in horizontal layers. Use no liquid. The processing brings out of the peppers a thick liquid which will almost cover them in the jar. Process pint jars 30 min. seal and keep in cool place.

After an illness resulting from a stroke of paralysis several months ago, Mr. W. W. Scarborough died at the home of his Mr. M. W. Scarborough, on Jefferson Street, Monday afternoon last, aged 66 years.
