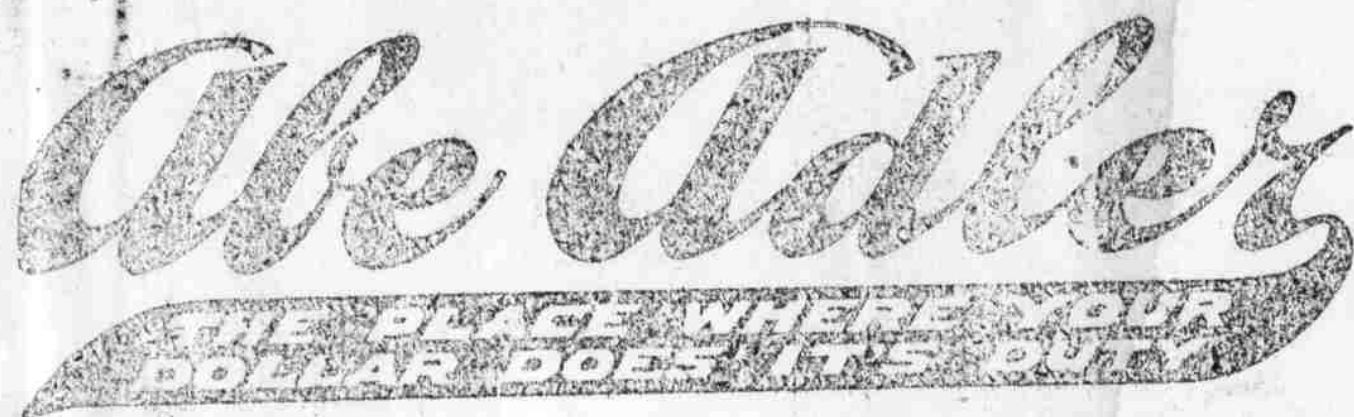

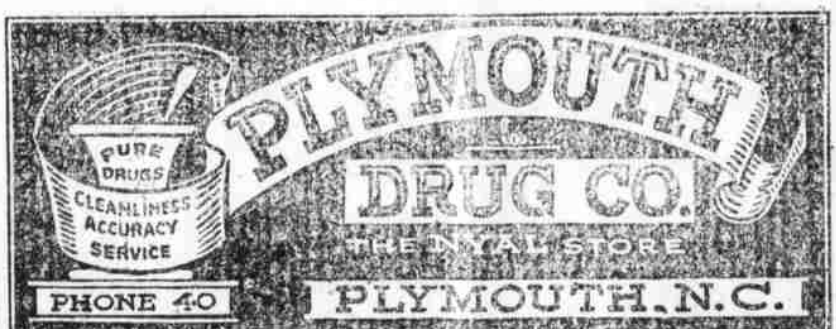

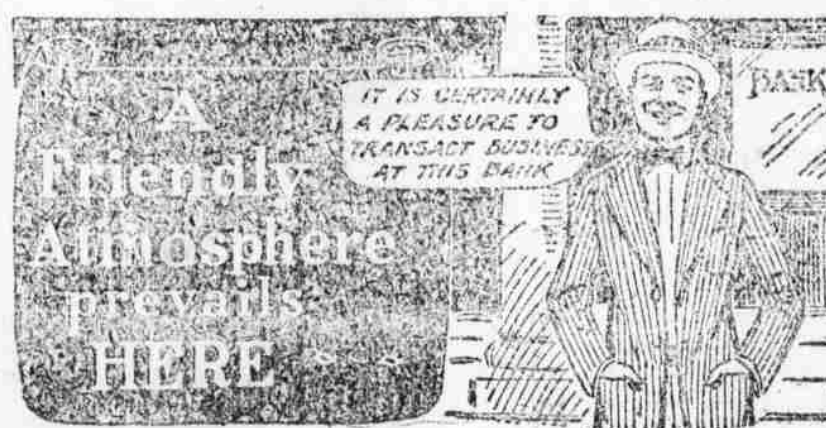


NOTICE OF SALE

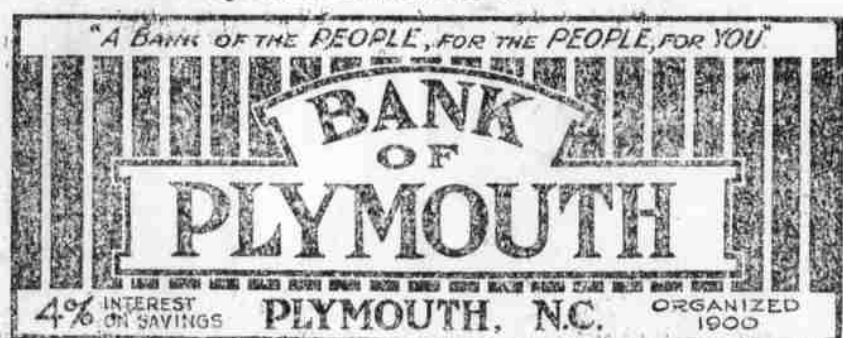
