Red Cross Announcement.

No more wool will be given out by the Chapter until an allotment of knitting has been received. In cases where a garment has been begun without sufficient wool to finish, an exception will be made. This is in accordance with instructions from Aslanta.

The allotment of refugee garments is rapidly being cut and assembled at the work room for distribution. These plain little garments are a pathetic appeal from the 600,000 destitute children of France to the mothers of Plymouth, and it is earnestly hoped that, at least twenty women will come or send for six or more of these garments before the closing hour Tuesday. Cold weather approaches and the entire number should be finished and shipped by the first of October. A sample garment will be furnished with each package; also sewing cotton.
