CLUB NOTES.

Sandwich Peppers.

Red peppers, one bushel. 3 Onions, size of an egg. 1-2 gallon vinegar, 1 box mustard, 2 lbs. brown sugar, celery seed to taste. Remove seed and soak

peppers in brine one day and night.

Run peppers and onions thru meat chopper. Let this cook until tender then add sugar, mustard and celery seed.

Put vinegar on and bring to boiling point, thicken with flour to consistency of starch. Add this to peppers and cook down until thick. Put in sterilized jars and seal.

Rats aid Germany.

Dr. Kilgore, State Director of Agriculture Extension Service in N. C., writes us that they wish to put on a campaign for killing rats and mice beginning now and lasting thru the first week in November. Rats waste more food stuffs than our wheatless days save. The food they waste in one year in the U. States would feed all Belgium for twelve months. This waste is more than \$200,000,000.

Rats and mice are German allies therefore it is the duty of every American to help exterminate them.

Among these requirements is one that no copies shall be given away, and another, and the one hitting country weeklies the hardest says: "No publisher may continue subscriptions after three months after date of expiration, unless subscription are renewed and paid for."
