Another Camp School.

Another bright jewel in the mag-
nificent crown of educational insti-
tutions for Brevard—a camp school
for girls. All should rejoice in the
acquisition, credit for which is due
Miss Katherine Erwin, who left no
stone unturned in an effort to show
to best advantage the unexcelled
desirability of this section for such
an institution. In this connection
we would feel it derelict to one of
our highest duties as a newspaper
did we fail to exercise this oppor-
tunity to commend Miss Erwin for
the spirit and determination which
directed her in this good work.
But it was only in keeping with her
modest though commendable pub-
lic-spiritedness and love for doing
good, another notable evidence of
which was recently recorded in her
efforts in behalf of the sale of the
Red Cross Christmas Seals. Herein
are examples of praiseworthy
useful service deserving of emula-
tion by numbers of young men and
women in Brevard who are fritter-
ing their time and energies away
with trifling things that will re-
round neither to the good of the
community nor individual.

Our New Road Law.

The new road law for Transyl-
vania as given in the News last
week was received, studied and
discussed with considerable inter-
est because it is a radical departure
from the old order of things.

In addition to any political sig-
nificance that may be attached to
the new road law, it will be both
commended and disapproved by
men of all parties, and for several
reasons in that it is a bill touching
an important subject. The law
represents ripe judgment in a num-
ber of its phases and probably
oversights in others.

While some will object to confer-
ring full road authority upon
appointive officers and taking such
out of the hands of the county
commissioners, who were elected to
take charge of such matters, others
see in this a wise provision and a
long stride toward progressive road
building. The county commis-
sioners have plenty to which they
advantageously can turn their at-
tention in behalf of the county
without being monthly stormed
with distractive road matters.

Far-seeing politicians probably
see imaginary issues appear on the
political horizon but with a level-
headed republican on the board
with two competent democrats and
a republican attorney for the
board it is about as free of politics
as it could possibly be.

Wisely no provision is made for
the election or appointment of suc-
cessors to the present board after a
period of four years. If they can
get any money to spend they will
enter upon a program of progress-
ive road building and they will
through necessity do many things
which will place them in more or
less disfavor during the next three
or four years for the reason that
many citizens will oppose them in
their road building, therefore, mat-
ters not how efficient their service,
they could not be elected soon, but
passing years will add gradually to
their popularity and at the end of
four years they will be held in
popular favor by the people who
will be grateful that they have
good roads to travel.

Two farmers against one busi-
ness man on the board was another
good stroke and especially that
one of them comes from a section

through which the road to Toxa-
way leads, for they need and will
of course demand road improve-
ment in that direction.

Another good feature of the law
is the provision for a road super-
visor, without whom the greatest
possible good could not be accom-
plished with the money to be ex-
pended.

If the county is to enter upon a
road building program it is noth-
ing but right that the county com-
missioners be relieved of this road
work and its many responsibilities
for they have plenty to do without
this. A road commission without
authority in these matters would
at times be at cross purposes with
the authorities and as a result there
would be differences, political
and otherwise, that would not con-
tribute to the efficiency of road
administration, therefore we are
glad to see a radical change in mat-
ters of road building.

Regret has been expressed that
no limitation was put on the
amount of money the commis-
sioners should spend but it is highly
probable that all they can get their
hands on will not be out of propor-
tion to our needs. Further regret
has been expressed that while an
annual published statement is re-
quired a detailed one is not ordered.
Some sections feel uneasy about
the lack of provision for an equita-
ble or proportionate distribution of
work in the various townships.
Others see an oversight in the ab-
sence of a provision making all the
records a public matter and some
think the commissioners, however
honorable, should be under bond to
guarantee proper administration.

All in all, the law appears to us
to be a splendid one and the small
defects to which attention has been
called, we trust, will not result in
any miscarriage in the work to be
done. The county is to be con-
gratulated upon having such a
business-like and progressive board
to manage its road matters.

The new county law does not
provide for a bond issue but the
News is living in hopes of an in-
creased revenue under a general
state road law. Probably our own
funds will be supplemented by ten
or fifteen thousand dollars from the
government.

The News welcomes the change,
which will doubtless place the au-
thor, Mr. G. W. Wilson, in dis-
favor for a while, but in years to
come most of us will congratulate
him upon his good judgment in the
matter and probably clamor for a
monument to the pioneer road
builder.

We have the legal machinery
for better roads. We need the
money with which to build them
and it behooves all classes of people
who desire to see a better day and
would welcome improved condi-
tions in about all stations in life, to
bend their energies toward plans
for raising revenue for entering
upon a progressive road building
era in Transylvania.

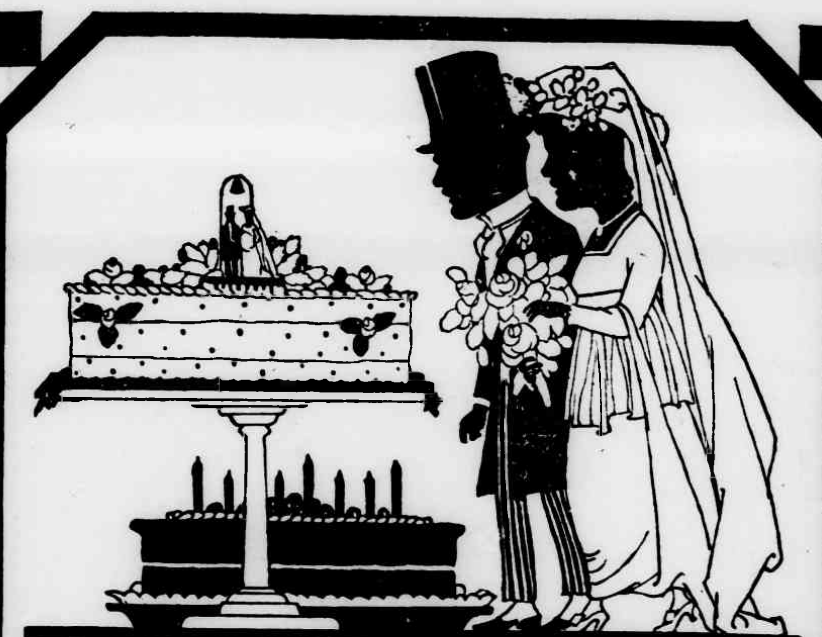
