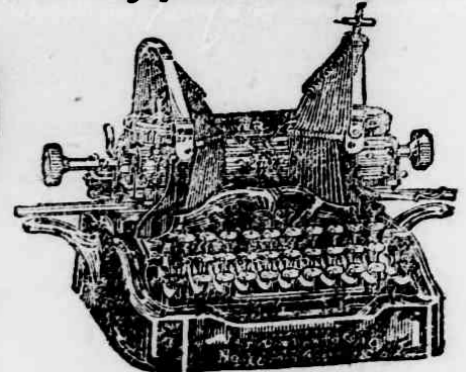
The Institute received recently a box of quilts from the Woman's Home Missionary Society of Bryson City. Many such gifts are received during the year from the various societies as well as from private individuals.

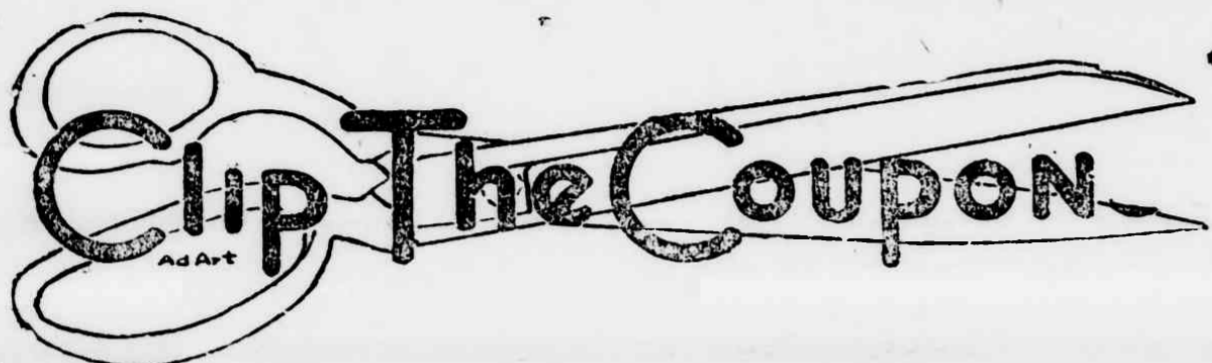
